PHILOSOPHICAL IMPLICATION OF DHVANI by ANAND AMALADASS, De Nobili Research Library, Vienna, 1984. Pages 240. Price not given.

Anandayardhana's discussion on *Dhvani* is important in he *Alamkāra-Sāstra*, but its implications have far-teaching consequences in the line of the Philosophy of symbol, language, and hermeneutics. This is the *quintessence* of this well-written and well-produced book. Besides giving a detailed analysis of the text *Dhvanyāloka* or *Sahrdayāloka*, Dr. Amaladass, who was a student of Prof. K. Kunjunni Raja, brings out Anandayardhana's thinking process, progress in his thinking pattern, his major and minor points, his emphasis and his digression. The major thrust of the book is to view *dhvani* as a symbol language in all its implications. Symbol is understood in a philosophico-theological sense, which points to a reality beyond itself in and through what it connotes.

If the symbol character of dhvani is accepted, then one sees the need for the science of interpretation. (Hermeneutics). The author has made an attempt to read the sacred scriptures, which are outside the poetic realm, the dhvani way. Anandavardhana has himself given a strong hint to this exercise when he took the Mahā-bhārata and explained it as a work of Sāntarasa pointing to Mokṣa as the foremost of human values.

The work under review throws a new light on *dhvani* and will be a welcome addition to the subject.
